remove humidity and heat from the air. The 1978 boiler would be replaced with two smaller high efficiency boilers. The goals will be to reduce the load on the existing heat pumps, improve energy consumption efficiency, to reduce the humidity in the school and reduce the chance of mold issues.



From The Principal's Desk

The big focus for my article this month has to do with what I do when I am not in the building. There are several times during the year that I am out of the building for meetings. I often get asked what I do at those meetings and if they are really necessary. I really would prefer to be in the building with the staff and students, but also realize there are conferences and meetings that I do need attend. When I was teaching, it was more work to be gone and I would have to say that being an administrator is no different. A day out of the building means more work when I return. With that being said, here are the items that I would like to expand on.

1. Student of the Month. Our high school student of the month for the month of December is Meri Beth Hietbrink. Meri Beth is the daughter of Dan and Ruth Hietbrink. Our middle school student of the month is Brian Heusman. Brian is the son of David and Sharon Heusman. Both of these students are very hard workers and are respected by their peers.



- 2. Anita Archer. I recently attended a workshop hosted by Anita Archer. Her presentation dealt with explicit instruction and increasing student engagement. We have had several teachers attend her workshops in the past and they are implementing some of those strategies in the classroom. This workshop was designed for administrators so we know what to look for when we are in the classroom. This was a very engaging workshop and well worth the time to be out of the building.
- **3. State Principal's Conference.** Every fall the NAESP (Nebraska Association of Elementary School Principals) and the NSASSP (Nebraska State Association of Secondary School Principals) host a conference in Kearney. The purpose of the conference is to bring in top-notch speakers and peer presenters to share with building administrators across the state. One of the most valuable speakers I heard present this past fall was on the concept of "flipped" staff development. The concept here is to maximize facetime with your staff by using technology instead of having meetings to discuss when the next fire drill will be or who is out of the building this week. I will be working on this strategy for next fall as I realize how valuable our teachers time is.
- **4. RtI updates.** We are currently in year two of our RtI (response to intervention) implementation with ESU #4. Our team includes: Ms. Shea (guidance counselor), Mrs. Eilers (Title teacher), Mrs. Trauernicht (SPED), Mrs. Hier (classroom teacher), Mrs. Mackey (classroom teacher) and Ms. Zwygart (classroom teacher and technology). We have been paired with a team from Lourdes Central Catholic as they are a similar sized district and they also use the *Treasures* reading program. During our most recent meeting, we looked at Tier II reading interventions and how to best implement those interventions for next year. We also looked at our decision rules that we will use to decide which students will need an intervention. Our goal with RtI is to ensure that all students are reading at or above grade level. We will also be looking at how to provide enrichment for those students who are reading at or above grade level.
- **5. ESU 4 Principals Cadre.** Several times during the year I attend a half-day cadre meeting at ESU 4 in Auburn. All principals in ESU 4 are invited to attend. Membership each meeting varies based on each principal's schedule. Topics of discussions include but are not limited to curriculum, assessment, technology, teacher evaluation and other professional development. A highlight this year has been a book study. We are currently reading *The No Complaining Rule: Positive Ways to Deal with Negativity at Work* by Jon Gordon. This has been a great book and I would highly recommend you read it if you have a chance.



Girls' State, Boys' State, and Junior Law Cadet

Cornhusker Girls' State

Cornhusker Girls' State applications are due by **Tuesday, February 21**st. All junior girls are encouraged to apply for this experience. Girls' State is a nonpartisan program that teaches young women responsible citizenship and love for God and Country. Since the inception of the Girls State program in 1937, nearly one million young people have had the opportunity to learn first-hand how their state and local government works. High school girls, who have completed their junior year, spend an intensive week of study, working together as self-governing citizens at Auxiliary sponsored Girls State programs in every state. They learn how to participate in the functioning of their state's government in preparation for their future roles as responsible adult citizens. The maximum enrollment for this year will be 410 delegates, with more than one girl from each school if funding allows. This year's Girls' State will be at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln city campus from June 1st through June 7th, 2014. Contact Karla Daehling for more information.

Cornhusker Boys' State

Applications are currently being accepted for Cornhusker Boys' State. This annual citizenship program sponsored by the Nebraska American Legion is designed to provide youth with a better understanding of how city, county, and state governments operate. Each boy is sponsored locally by an organization such as an American Legion Post, or by some other patriotic, civic, fraternal, or religious group in cooperation with the local American Legion Post.

American Legion Cornhusker Boys' State is set up as a functional "51st State" and each boy learns how government subdivisions operate by actually doing the job. Participants will campaign for offices, hold elections, take part in band and chorus, compete in athletics, and be involved in other varied activities as part of the citizenship training program. They will set up their own state government and draft bills.

All junior boys are eligible to apply for Boys' State. This year's session will be from June 1st through June 7th at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus.

Deadline for application is February 21st, 2014, with the Legion Post in charge.

2014 Junior Law Cadet Program

Nebraska Department of the American Legion

Basic Requirements:

High school junior in good health & able to participate in physical activities.

Must possess a positive attitude & display respect for law enforcement.

Good grooming, average or above average scholastic record, & able to share the knowledge gained through the program.

Must possess a valid Nebraska operator's license or learner's permit.

This program gives students the chance to: drive a State Patrol car; learn to fire a service weapon, learn self-defense, pressure point control tactics, and assault prevention measures; and interact with law enforcement officers.

Two sessions offered – one for boys and one for girls. The program now takes place at the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center in Grand Island.



What is Safe Homes?




Safe Homes asks parents to supervise their youth by always knowing:

How Do We Get Started?




