

# NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY INFORMATION

The selection of new members for National Honor Society will begin the first week of April. Each school may arrive at its own selection process provided it follows the basic guidelines of the national organization. These basic guidelines require a 5-member faculty council selected by the principal to handle the selection process. It also requires that students be considered on the basis of four criteria: Academics, Service, Character, and Leadership. Students must be a Sophomore, Junior or Senior and have attended that school for at least one semester.

In regard to the candidate interview we will give each candidate a list of guidelines which will be helpful to them in having the best possible interview and help make the interview informative as well as a learning experience. Students will sign up for an interview time and be given a list of areas the questions will be covering. Each council member will select a question for the interview.

The interview will have a 5 point maximum. This makes 50 the total number of points that can be earned. The entire process is described fully in the following paragraphs.

## **“NHS Selection Process”**

The National Association of Secondary School Principals founded the National Honor

Society in 1921. The purpose from its inception has been to promote high academic standards while maintaining individual qualities of character, leadership and service. Selection, then, is based on character, leadership, scholarship, and service.

Students cannot apply for this honor, but are selected by a 5-member Faculty Council. The procedure for selection at Sterling High School is as follows:

1) Student’s academic records are reviewed. To be eligible a student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of B+(90%) at the end of the first semester of their sophomore year.

2) Students who are eligible scholastically are notified and told that for further consideration for selection to the NHS Chapter they must complete a Student Activity Information Form. This form is not an application, but a method of recognizing all student accomplishments by a uniform method. They are asked to list their participation in activities, elected and appointed leadership positions, community service/activities, work experience, recognition and special awards.

3) Each faculty member who has been associated with the student in class or activities will fill out a questionnaire evaluating the student in the areas of leadership, character and service. This question-

naire will be given to the council and included in the evaluation process.

Academics: up to 30 pts.  
Service: up to 5 pts.  
Character: up to 5 pts.  
Leadership: up to 5 pts.  
Interview: up to 5 pts.

Total: 50 pts.

\*Bonus - Returning: 2 pts.

4) Eligible students who return their Activity Form will then be interviewed by the Faculty Council members. Points will be assessed to each student according to the following scale.

GPA: 100- 30 pts.  
99 - 29 pts.  
98 - 28 pts.  
97 - 27 pts.  
96 - 26 pts.  
95 - 25 pts.  
94 - 24 pts.  
93 - 23 pts.  
92 - 22 pts.  
91 - 21 pts.  
90 - 20 pts.

\*“Bonus” refers to 1 point for each PREVIOUS year a student has gone through the selection process including the interview and not been selected. A total of 2 points is possible.

**A STUDENT MUST EARN 38 POINTS TO BECOME A MEMBER!!**

This puts a 60% emphasis on academics as criteria for NHS membership, but also allows the Faculty Council to evaluate the candidate on the basis of the remaining three criteria: character, service, and leadership.

Following the objective assessment of all candidates, the Faculty Council members will score each candidate based on their interview, Faculty Questionnaire, and Student Activity Form. Candidates receiving an average of at least 38 points by the Faculty Council will be inducted into the

Sterling NHS chapter.

Membership in the National Honor Society is an honor and not a Privilege. No student may apply for membership. Students who are in the sophomore, junior and senior classes are eligible for membership. According to the National Constitution of the NHS a student must be in the school at least one semester before becoming eligible for membership in that chapter. Membership may be transferred to another chapter if the student moves after being inducted.



There were 245 participants from the following 17 schools in Nebraska: Chadron Middle School, Pine Creek Elementary-Bennington, Heartland Community School-Henderson, Johnson County Central-Cook, Sterling Public School, Randolph Public School, St. John Lutheran-Seward, St. Bernard School-Omaha, St. Joseph's School-Beatrice, Wausa Public School, Holy Cross School-Omaha, St. Mary's Catholic School-David City, St. Rose of Lima School-Crofton, Emerson Hubbard, Deshler Lutheran School, Parkview Christian-Lincoln, Newcastle Public School. Twelve finalists were chosen from these schools.

Taylor Arens from St. Rose of Lima Catholic School in Crofton took first place in the state with her essay. All State finalists were present at the State Capitol's Werner Chamber for a Recognition Ceremony on Friday, March 22. They read their essays aloud to their mothers and a group including the new 2013 Mother of the year, Jan Schiferl, other Nebraska Mothers, their families, First Lady Sally Ganem Heineman, and State Senator Tyson Larson. The other finalist were: Cameron Lancaster (St. Joseph's in Beatrice), Kalyn Martinson (Newcastle Public), Matthew Sherman (St. John Lutheran in Seward), McKayla Vermeer (Sterling Public), Michael Mangold (Pine Creek Elementary in Bennington), Monica Thipphavong (Johnson County Central in Tecumseh), Oliver Fox (Chadron Middle

School), Rhianna Wilhelm (Heartland Community School-Henderson), Samantha Dibbert (Randolph Public School), Savannah Morgan (Parkview Christian-Lincoln), Sierra Mann (St. Bernard School-Omaha).

The 1<sup>st</sup> place essay has been forwarded on to the national competition and will be announced at the American Mothers National Convention in late April. We hope to have the finalists' essays published in the Lincoln Journal Star and Omaha World Herald newspapers in April. Please take the time to read them; they are outstanding.

We are proud of each student for taking the time and effort to participate in this contest. The essays submitted were wonderful and heartfelt. Each person should be proud of his or her work and each mother should be honored to read such wonderful words.
