Superintendent Notes by Mr. Knippelmeyer

School is off and running, students are learning in the classroom, and activities are in full swing! With each newsletter I will highlight activity from the previous school board meeting.

The board of education held a budget workshop on September 2nd to discuss planned expenditures, revenue allocations, and future projects for the upcoming school year and beyond. The board is very cognizant of the valuation increases in our district and the reliance that schools have on property taxes. The certified assessed valuation for the Sterling school district went from \$240,030,859 to \$285,042,508, an increase of 18.7%. The district's fiscal goals are to continue to provide quality, progressive education while remaining financially prudent on behalf of the taxpayers who support public education. Additional important information to know is that as a school district, we are no longer an equalized district, which means we do not receive state aid. For the 2015-16 school years, that means a loss of \$800,000 in funding from the state. Going forward, as a district we need to plan on being a non-equalized district, which means no state aid. If the state aid formula remains as it is, we would need to see a dramatic increase in student enrollment, or property valuations will need to drop dramatically in order for us to receive state aid. As we worked through the budget process, the board set goals and approved educational direction for the schools' administration to follow in the upcoming school year.



During the September 16th school board meeting, the board of education voted to approve the 2015-16 budget and property tax request. The general fund levy is set at \$.855751, the special building fund levy is set at \$.050293, the bond fund is set at \$.063786, and the Qualified Capital Purpose Undertaking Fund is set at \$.026044. We would like to thank our community members and patrons for your support of our school system! Other action items taken during the board meeting included: approval for the administration to solicit bids for new bleachers in the gym and approval for the administration to solicit bids to replace our current phone system and teacher computers.

STUDENT AND ADULT CONDUCT AT SCHOOL ACTIVITIES: We want all of our students, parents, teachers, and community members to have an enjoyable experience as you cheer on the Jets at different school activities. We are asking for your help in making this an enjoyable experience for all. All spectators that attend our different activities are asked to sit and watch the games or stand in such a manner that it does not interfere with others viewing the game.

We are asking parents to help monitor their children and have them watch the game with you and/or their friends. Children should not be running the halls or playing games on the stage. We are all here to cheer on the Jets and our students and children are expected to be in the stands cheering on the Jets too. If students are found to be running the halls they will be asked to return to their seats and their parents.

As it states on our athletic programs...Let the players play, the coaches coach, the officials officiate, the spectators be positive, and let's all be committed to excellence! Thank you for helping us make our activity and athletic events an enjoyable experience for all. **Go Jets!**



FLU: The flu season will soon be upon us. The Southeast District Health Department has their "Vaccine for Children"(VFC) Flu Vaccine supply. The CDC recommends getting the flu vaccine as soon as it is available. (See www.sedhd.org for the immunization clinic hours.) In addition to the injectable flu vaccine for six months and older, this year we will offer the Flu Mist. The Flu Mist will cover four different types of virus. There is a theory that the mist is twice as effective in children ages 2-5 years of age. As with all vaccines, a screening must be done prior to receiving Flu Mist. One of the requirements for flu mist is to be between 2- 49 years of age with no history of asthma. (VFC can only treat well children to their 19th Birthday) Reminder: You can not get the flu from a flu vaccine. On September 11th, the fifth and sixth graders went on a field trip to Table Rock for Living History Day. They started the day out talking about the events that happened on September 11, 2001. The American Legion did the Raising of the Colors, we all said the Pledge of Allegiance, and then they lowered the flag to half mast to honor those who perished during 9-11.




They again had several presentations throughout the day, and here are a few of the student's favorites. The first one was David Seay. He talked to the students about different musical instruments used in Native American villages. The first instrument was a yak. It was used for signaling or warning people in the village of danger. It all depended on the sound, if it was for a signal or for a warning. He told them when people moved from place to place, they took their music with them. He played the song, "Give Me A Home Where the Buffalo Roam," on a saw. He also played different types of whistles with different sounds. He played the song, "I've Been Working on the Railroad," with 2 whistles at once. He told the students the Native Americans would go out into nature and try to copy the sounds they heard. One of the student's favorite instruments were the rattles, because he had one made out of a turtle shell and they all think they can make one. Good Luck with that parents!! He told us the Native Americans would take whatever they could find, including bones, to play music.



We also got to see a 1916 steam engine, which cost \$2,000 back then. Farmers would go together to buy one, take turns and help each other combine their crops. They also had a 1928 Case Thrashing machine. The straw that went through this machine was used for things like stuffing mattresses.

Bob Wolffe, from Sterling, was there with his Stationary Baler. Back then, they had to hand wire the bales, which Bob demonstrated. These machines were very dangerous to start, because there were no belts, or protective gear covering anything.



Mr. Chris Salberg was also a demonstrator. He talked to us about the old print shop that was in Table Rock for years. He explained all the steps they had to take to make a newspaper and how much work and time it took. The kids always like that one, mostly because of Mr. Salberg being there. Plus, he does a great job of explaining all of the machines and how they worked.

The day was filled with many other presentations and lots of learning. All the presenters do a great job!!






